

Captain Kevin Mailman

Captain Kevin Mailman has worked for the Worcester County Sheriff's Office for 27 years, starting his career in 1996. He has been assigned to a variety of units with the Sheriff's Officer as well as task forces outside the Sheriff's Office. Most of his career has been dedicated to working gangs, intelligence, and investigations. Kevin's specialty is acquiring intelligence, cultivating informants, and criminal investigations on the local and federal level. He has also worked part time for Paxton Police, Rutland Police and Hubbardston Police. He is still currently working for Rutland Police as well.

He was promoted to Sergeant for the Detective Bureau where he supervised all the cases inside and outside the Sheriff's Office. He was promoted to Lieutenant and was placed back into the jail, where he was a shift commander. After 18 months he was moved back to the detective unit as the Detective Lieutenant. In 2021, he was promoted to the rank of Captain in the detective unit as the Detective Captain.

As a detective, he was assigned to the Worcester Police Department Gang Unit from 2007 to 2013. There he was involved in homicides, shooting investigations, state and local investigations, and other major crimes. This partnership helped identify hundreds of gang members, cultivate informants, and information on major cases.

Captain Mailman's investigations and intel gathering, has led to high profile cases ranging from a murder for hire on an Assistant District Attorney to homicide cases. Captain Mailman was also involved with DEA-OCDETF (Organized Crime Drug Enforcement Task Force) for two cases, Operation Northern Kings and Operation RedWolf. Both of these 18 month long cases were instrumental in the takedown of Latin Kings and Bloods in the Central Massachusetts area.

Captain Mailman was also been a lead instructor, traveling the country teaching local, state, and federal agencies on different aspects of gang investigations and identifiers. He has also instructed on interview and interrogation, gangs, tactical communication, and other related topics. He has instructed over seven thousand officers across the nation.
